

Indians varsity 2022-2023 season begins on Nov. 22 hosting Buffalo

The Frankston Indians varsity basketball team opens its 2022-2023 season Tuesday, Nov. 22 against Buffalo at 2:15 p.m. in the Robert Loper Coliseum in Frankston, according to a report by Head Coach Scotty Albritton.

The Indians return six players from the 2021-2022 Region III Semifinalist team which finished in third place in District 19-2A. The team had a season record of 27-8 and a district mark of 7-3.



“We have a veteran team coming back off a regional tournament appearance,” Coach Albritton said.

Returning players are senior Caleb Ramsey, 5-11 point guard; sophomore Jake Westbrook, 6-0 guard; senior Kody Loebig, 6-2 guard; senior Benton Allen, 6-2 post; senior Kason Newport, 5-10 guard; and sophomore Reese Hicks, 6-0 post.

Ramsey is credited with 11.4 points per game (ppg), 3.2 rebounds per game (rpg); 4.2 assists per game (apg) and 3.1 steals per game. Westbrook posted 13.3 ppg; 6.3 rpg, 3.4 apg and 2.4 steals per game. Loebig was credited with 8.9 ppg, 3.4 rpg, 1.5 apg and 1.8 steals per game. Allen recorded 7.8 ppg, 8.2 rpg, and 2.3 steals per game. Newport had 5.2 ppg. Hicks posted 2.6 ppg and 4.2 rpg.

“We have some added depth this year that we have not had in the past,” according to the head coach in his sixth year at Frankston with a 96-61 record with the Indians and 310-200 overall.

Notable newcomers mentioned by Coach Albritton are senior Ké Aundré Barnes, 6-7 post; junior Kaymon Davis, 6-1 guard; sophomore Tyler Rogers, 5-10 guard; freshman A.J. Donnell, 6-1 guard; and freshman Davis Holladay, 5-10 guard.

Continuing his preview of the Indians season, the Indian coach said that the foundation of the team will be defense.

“After giving up just 34.1 points per game last year, we want to continue to build on that foundation as a staple for our program,” he said.

Coach Albritton said the Indians’ schedule will be “beefing up” this year by playing several ranked 2A and 3A teams, along with playing several 3A and 4A teams in non-district and in tournaments.

“With high expectations, we are hoping that the tougher schedule will prepare us for a tough district and the playoffs,” he said.
