## 2023-2024 Dress Code Update

### FRANKSTON ISD STUDENT DRESS CODE 2023-2024

#### DRESS AND GROOMING

Frankston Independent School District's dress code is established to support grooming and hygiene, prevent disruptions, and minimize safety hazards. FISD has the responsibility of maintaining an atmosphere conducive to learning and does so by providing not only a secure educational environment, but also standards of acceptable behavior and appearance among students. Campus administrators have the right to appraise **ANY** fashion or fad to determine whether it is appropriate school attire. This dress code is subject to change and all decisions are at the discretion of campus administration.

It is the responsibility of students and parents to be knowledgeable of the dress code and comply with the following standards:

#### TOPS

1. No see-through or backless clothing.
2. No low-cut shirts or blouses.
3. No midriff when arms are raised or exposed shoulders. (No sleeveless)
4. No images or references that are obscene, sexual, profane, promote tobacco, drugs, gangs, or alcohol.
5. No undergarments showing at any time.

#### BOTTOMS

1. No athletic tights, spandex shorts, or excessively form fitting clothing.
2. Skirts, dresses, or shorts must have hems that are no shorter than 2 inches above the knee.
3. No holes, rips or tears showing skin above the kneecap.
4. No pajamas, bedroom attire, or loungewear. (ex. clothing made from fleece, satin, silk, or flannel.)
5. No undergarments showing at any time.

#### SHOES

1. No house shoes. (ex. shoes that are made for indoor use.)
2. Elementary students must wear closed-toe shoes. Athletic shoes are recommended.

#### ACCESSORIES

1. No hats, hoods or head coverings indoors.
2. No do-rags, shower caps, or rollers.

#### Consequences for accessory violations.

\*See student handbook for specific consequences regarding accessory violations.

#### SECONDARY CAMPUSES ONLY

Frankston Independent School District wants its students, staff, and parents to know the priority we place on safety and security. All staff and students must have their own ID and Keycards to enter any building in the district.

#### ID and Keycard Requirements

- Must be hung on a lanyard around the neck during the entire school day.
- Must be worn with the picture facing out.
- Must not be defaced or altered. (no personal stickers, no coloring, etc.)
- Must be worn on the outermost layer of clothing.

# House Bill 3

TX HB 3 | 2023 | 88th Legislature  
– Sent to Governor

- **Armed Security Officer Required – 37.0814**
  - › District shall determine the appropriate # of armed security officers for each district campus
  - › Min of 1 armed security officer must be present during regular school hours at each district campus.



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# House Bill 3

TX HB 3 | 2023 | 88th Legislature  
– Sent to Governor

- **Armed Security Officer Required – 37.0814**
  - › Security officer must be one of the following:
    - » A school district peace officer
    - » A school resource officer
    - » A commissioned peace officer employed as security personnel under 37.081



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# House Bill 3

TX HB 3 | 2023 | 88th Legislature  
– Sent to Governor

- **Armed Security Officer Required – 37.0814**
  - › If the district is unable to comply, the District may claim a good cause exception if the non-compliance is due to:
    - » Lack of Funding
    - » Lack of available personnel who qualify to serve as a security officer



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# House Bill 3

TX HB 3 | 2023 | 88th Legislature  
– Sent to Governor

- **Armed Security Officer Required – 37.0814**
  - › If a good cause exemption is claimed, then the District must develop an alternative standard, which may include:
    - » School Marshals
    - » School Guardians
    - » Private Security



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# House Bill 3

TX HB 3 | 2023 | 88th Legislature  
– Sent to Governor

- **Role of Armed Persons – 37.089**
  - › Only peace officers may perform “routine” LEO duties, including making arrests, unless in response to an emergency that poses a threat of death or serious bodily injury.
  - › Peace officer duties must still be included in campus and district documents describing their roles & responsibilities – 37.081(d)



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# House Bill 3

TX HB 3 | 2023 | 88th Legislature  
– Sent to Governor

- **Annual Safety Allotment – 48.115**
  - › \$10 for each student in ADA
  - › Plus \$1 for each student per every \$50 increase in Basic Allotment under 48.051 which exceeds \$6,160
  - › \$15,000 per campus (virtual campuses are not included)



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## Private Security Company

### Pros

- Can provide armed security if board approves a local policy
- Possibly cheaper than law enforcement



### Cons

- Can only provide security; no law enforcement or any other duties
- Unsure of training received
- No mandated training other than level 2 or 3 training for armed security

## School Marshal Program

69 of 1200 Districts in Texas use this program to date

### Pros

- 80 HRS training through a TCOLE academy
- May access handgun at the school specified by the board.
- Must use only frangible duty ammunition
- Requires psychological testing
- Required to obtain LTC prior to academy



### Cons

- Jurisdiction is limited
- If the marshal's primary duties include direct, regular contact with students the handgun must be locked in a safe
- Must renew license every two years
- Other liability concerns for district and individuals

# School Guardian

445 of 1200 Districts in Texas use this program to date

## Pros

- Only requires LTC and 16 hours additional training through DPS sanctioned provider
- District can authorize any employee to carry on district property



## Cons

- Limited training
- Limited jurisdiction
- Other liability concerns for district and individuals
